Reflection

In today's Gospel reading Jesus cures the leper and warns him not to report this to anyone. This feature of Jesus' ministry is special to Mark's Gospel, possibly the Lord knew how people could misunderstand who he was. A revolutionary came to overthrow the Romans, a teacher, a healer, a magician, a god. This misunderstanding would cause people to come to him for the wrong reasons. Who Jesus is to us, is the most important question we can ask ourselves. Is he someone who can just heal our infirmities and help us to get what we want for ourselves or others? I suppose the deeper underlying question is, 'What do we want?'. Do we want to have a personal relationship with Jesus and so learn from him or do we just want something from him, when it suits?

The leper pleaded to Jesus on his knees, 'If you want to you can cure me.' Jesus responds to the leper and us, 'Of course I want to.'

Jesus wants us to get to know who he really is, so that we can tell others about him. But we can only get to know someone by spending time with them. What do we really want?

Lord Jesus, place in my heart a desire to please You

and fill my mind with thoughts of Your Love,

so that I may grow in Your Wisdom and enjoy Your Peace. Amen

Pope Francis' Monthly Intentions for February: Violence against women

We pray for women who are victims of violence, that they may be protected by society and have their sufferings considered and heeded.

Readings for 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time – Year B

First reading

Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron, 'If a swelling or scab or shiny spot appears on a man's skin, a case of leprosy of the skin is to be suspected. The man must be taken to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests who are his sons. 'The man is leprous: he is unclean. The priest must declare him unclean; he is suffering from leprosy of the head. A man infected with leprosy must wear his clothing torn and his hair disordered; he must shield his upper lip and cry, "Unclean, unclean." As long as the disease lasts he must be unclean; and therefore he must live apart: he must live outside the camp.'

Psalm 31

R: You are my hiding place, O Lord; you surround me with cries of deliverance.

1 Happy the man whose offence is forgiven,
whose sin is remitted.

O happy the man to whom the Lord imputes no guilt,
in whose spirit is no guile

2 But now I have acknowledged my sins;
my guilt I did not hide.
I said: "I will confess my offence to the Lord."
And you, Lord, have forgiven the guilt of my sin.

3 Rejoice, rejoice in the Lord,
exult, you just!

Second reading

1 Corinthians 10:31 – 11:1

Whatever you eat, whatever you drink, whatever you do at all, do it for the glory of God. Never do anything offensive to anyone – to Jews or Greeks or to the Church of God; just as I try to be helpful to everyone at all times, not anxious for my own advantage but for the advantage of everybody else, so that they may be saved. Take me for your model, as I take Christ.

Gospel

Mark 1:40 – 45

A leper came to Jesus and pleaded on his knees: 'If you want to' he said 'you can cure me.' Feeling sorry for him, Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him. 'Of course I want to!' he said. 'Be cured!' And the leprosy left him at once and he was cured. Jesus immediately sent him away and sternly ordered him, 'Mind you say nothing to anyone, but go and show yourself to the priest, and make the offering for your healing prescribed by Moses as evidence of your recovery.' The man went away, but then started talking about it freely and telling the story everywhere, so that Jesus could no longer go openly into any town, but had to stay outside in places where nobody lived. Even so, people from all around would come to him.
