Jesus' feeding of the five thousand shows the remarkable generosity of God and his great kindness towards us. The multiplication of the boy's loaves and fishes shows exactly what God always does if we trust in Him. We may think that what we have to offer is too small and insignificant, but when we put everything into the hands of Jesus Christ, there is no telling what He can do with us and through us. Whatever we offer God He returns to us with great abundance. This Sunday's gospel foreshadows the Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist, including Jesus' actions as he takes the bread, gives thanks and distributes it among those gathered. As part of his prayer Jesus thanks God, setting an example for us to thank God, not only for food but for the many blessings and good things that come our way.

The hungry crowd is still with us today, crying out all over the world for the basic necessities of life. The sheer size of the problem may make us wonder how our own small offering could make any difference. Our loaf and fish may be any small amount we set aside for the good of others.

Lord, You satisfy the hunger and thirst of every living thing and so we look to You whenever we are in need, trusting in Your love and Your abundant goodness. As You once fed the hungry crowds with five loaves and two small fish, we ask that You would again fill those who are empty this day. Pour out Your Spirit on all who hunger and thirst. We pray that we might come to know the abundant life that comes from You.



We pray for those who have dedicated their lives to feeding the hungry in our society, to housing the homeless, caring for the abandoned and bringing comfort to the sick.

This Sunday is the inaugural World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly. Pope Francis has given it the theme "I am with you always" from the Gospel of Matthew (Mt 28: 30). Bishop Oakley, the Chair of the Bishops' Committee for Marriage and Family Life, praises the elderly for their witness of faith and long fidelity to the Catholic Church. He said "They have so much to contribute to the church, even if they're not able to get to Mass anymore, they can still play a huge role within the body of Christ through their prayerful intercession."

Promoting the important connection between generations, Cardinal Nichols said, "Elderly people get isolated, grandparents often get forgotten. But a day of prayer will help us to remember that we are gifts to each other because we are gifts of God. And if we give thanks for those gifts, we'll appreciate them."

Sister's visit from St Elisabeth Convent, Belarus . . We are sincerely grateful



to you for considering our inquiry to create a small stall of our crafts at your Parish of St Patrick's on Friday 30th of July at 9.15am and on Sunday 1st of August at 9am and in this way support us in our challenging, yet rewarding work.

We would like to thank you for all your help and patronage in the past. Owing to your generosity, kindness and support we have been able to advance our ministry and help many more people in need. In recent years, we have been able to accommodate more than 180 residents at the rehab centre for men. We have also been able to help more women at a similar rehab centre that is run by our convent. St Elisabeth Convent, a Russian Orthodox community in Minsk, Belarus bears the name of the holy Martyr Grand Princess Elisabeth. It was founded in 1999 in the outskirts of Minsk and has originated from the sisterhood bearing the same name. The convent currently counts just under a hundred nuns and around 300 sisters of mercy. Taking up the ministry of our patron saint the sisters of our convent provide spiritual and social help to the sick and the suffering. To support and develop the above ministries, more than twenty workshops and studios operate within the frameworks of the Sisterhood. These include sewing and embroidery shops, candle workshop, wood-carving, stone and blacksmith workshops and many more. Some of the people working in the workshops are those who lost all hope in realizing their potential due to various illnesses. But the Lord gave a talent to everyone and these people have skilled hands and the desire to work. Together with the sisters these people produce beautiful articles with love and prayer in the convent's workshops.



Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle LOURDES 'Virtual Pilgrimage'... As the Diocese in unable to travel to Lourdes this year, there will be a 'Virtual Pilgrimage', providing opportunities for our Pilgrimage Family to join together in prayer and worship over the course of a week which starts on 31st July with a day at Ushaw. Unfortunately, numbers are restricted and places do need to be booked in advance.

Following our opening day of reflection at Ushaw, all other Masses and services will be streamed via YouTube or Facebook. During the week there will be a Service of Healing and a Bereavement Service. ONGOING FAITH WITNESS AGAINST HASSOCKFIELD . . . In October, the Home Office plans to open an Immigration Removal Centre at Hassockfield on the site of the former Medomsley Detention Centre. This will be for 80 women seeking asylum in the UK. The proposal is inhumane, unjust and incompatible with our faith which calls us to recognise the intrinsic dignity of each person. These women are people like ourselves who have the right to a place of safety and to be treated with respect and compassion. A monthly prayer vigil will be held at the barrier to Hassockfield on the first Sunday of each month at 3pm starting on Sunday 1st August. This will last for about 30 minutes and will incorporate a time of silent witness. Please support this with your prayer and, if at all possible, come along.
