Reflection 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C

I may have mentioned to you once or twice before that I am not a fan of football.

However, I came pretty close last Friday evening as I watched a match on the TV-Middlesbrough versus Manchester United in the FA Cup at Old Trafford- with friends who are most definitely football fans, and in particular fans of 'the Boro'.

What I saw of the game itself was neither here nor there for me. It was much the same as other games I have seen, although it turns out that by the time we switched on a good deal of the drama was already over- Ronaldo had missed a penalty, and Boro's equalising goal was shrouded in controversy. Some appeared to think that the goal should have been disallowed, but it was deemed to be in accordance with the rules of the game so it counted.

The penalty shoot-out was something else though. Talk about edge of your seat stuff. Boro emerged victorious, and even I may have let out a congratulatory 'yes!' when that happened... The next day I checked out the messages on the BBC Sport website. There was a mixed bag as you might expect, but on the whole huge support for Boro's win, even from Manchester fans. Many pointed out that the TV commentary appeared to favour Manchester. One such message was that as the game neared the end of extra time, a commentator said that Manchester only had a few minutes left to score again.
