The message of the transfiguration of Jesus is that there is a connection between suffering and death on the one hand and resurrection and glory on the other. Jesus heard from Moses and Elijah about the suffering and death he would have to experience as part of God's plan. The brilliant light and the voice from heaven give re-assurance that God will be with him on the journey.

The season of Lent presents an opportunity, along with prayer and fasting, to allow the brightness of God to shine into us and through us with love, compassion and kindness. We all grow brighter the more we try to be the God-like image that we are meant to reflect. The transfiguration is about letting the glory of God shine through us so that others can catch a glimpse of that glory.

Lord Jesus, give us grace to receive from you all that we need for today and the coming week. Bring rest and refreshment when we're exhausted; hope and faith when we're despondent and doubt you; and the assurance of your love and forgiveness when we're overwhelmed by our own weaknesses and failures. Inspire your church today with a renewed vision of your glory so that we and all your people may walk as children of light and, by your grace, reveal your presence in the world. Amen.



St. Patrick's Day 🧩

St. Patrick preached all over Ireland for forty years. Over these years he worked many miracles. He also wrote of his love for God in his 'Confessions.' The people in Ireland at the time were pagans or Druids and did not have any Christian education. St. Patrick learned the language of the people as well as their culture and traditions. While he was held captive, St. Patrick grew in his prayer life, turning to God for solace and comfort. As he grew older, he felt called to share his faith with the people of Ireland who did not know Christ or the One, True God. His understanding of the Irish people helped him to communicate with them and reach them in a way they could relate to. It is important to remember St Patrick is a saint who knew all the trials of life on a painful journey. He is a saint who understands our trials as we walk with Jesus and one another, and is a willing intercessor on our behalf.


